11. Address from County Representative

James Palin the County Commissioner gave an overview of the increase in people involved in Scouting and the membership in Buckinghamshire.

Districts had celebrated the 100 years of Cub Scouts and he had been given the opportunity to come to Milton Keynes to join in the celebrations.

James thanked Stuart and the team for the continued growth over the year, it had seen an increase in all sections over the year which was a 12% increase on the previous one.

In 2019 about 80 young people will embark on the 2019 World Scout Jamboree in America, Milton Keynes will be well represented.

James thanked everyone for tirelessly supporting Scouting in Buckinghamshire and if not a member there are many ways that you can share your skills and get involved through flexible volunteering schemes.

12 Guest Speaker – John May, Secretary General, Duke of Edinburgh's International Award

John said that he was currently in Scouting in Oxfordshire but knew about MK Scouting.

He had attended Cub Scout 100 year celebrations in Guildford and went on to tell everyone about a 'swimming up ceremony' and a conversation between the participant of this and the local Mayor.

He went on to tell of one boy who epitomised what Scouting is all about. In the 1990s he worked for UNICEF and as part of the Unite programme went to Uganda to see the immunisation and Aids awareness programmes, this was ground breaking.

Whilst there his minder, Joseph, told him that he was going to take him on a trip which took them a whole day and they ended up near the border with Rwanda in a refugee camp. In this camp were approximately 30,000 people, 15,000 were under the age of 15 who were unaccompanied. None of these had any parents or anyone who could read them stories or play with them. They had plenty of food and water.

One day Joseph came along with his secondary school friends before and after school to play with the children and to sing songs.

Joseph was a Scout and so were his friends and when asked why he did it and he just did it because he was a Scout and that is what they do.

Joseph told stories around the campfire about an eagle who laid an egg and the eagle then died and was taken in by a chicken, this eagle chick grew up thinking it was a chicken and did not learn how to fly like the eagles in the sky.

As leaders in Scouting we need to nurture our chickens into eagles and learn to fly and to set them free.

DISTRICT COMMISSIONER'S REPORT



An outsider looking at us in Milton Keynes over the last year can see nothing but quality Scouting, adventurous programmes, affluent Scout groups, a camp site that most are envious of and possibly the biggest program for growth in the country. None of this is by accident it takes x0,000's of volunteer

hours that make this all happen. In MK we are blessed with great leaders and dedicated administrators. Would be wrong of me to say the last year has all been plain sailing... A few key members of the team have left us for new adventures and I wish them all the best.

We are a huge District in comparison to most with approximately 1500 youth members and another 1000 on our joining lists. Over the last months we have been working hard on ways to bring as many of that 1000 into Scouting as possible. Milton Keynes is the fastest growing town in the country, therefore we need to be the fastest growing Scout District in the country to be able to keep pace with the demand. New sections need new leaders, new administrators and new premises. Traditionally the majority of our groups that we have meet in school halls, as the schools change out of local



government control it is becoming more difficult for us to find suitable meeting places at reasonable prices.

Our sectional ADC's have run some fantastic events over the last 12 months and are planning the next years camps and hikes. The uptake for some of the activities hasn't been as good as it should be. The District programme is there to encourage closer ties, team work and competition. The best bit for you the section leaders is that you don't have to organise them, it's all done for you.

The new data laws have forced changes on the way we conduct some of our administration, in MK we were well ahead of this, Bucks County have followed in our footsteps and are offering OSM to all sections. Our @mkscouts.org email system is here to help us all to be on the right side of GDPR and our website is the best in the country with many other districts and counties copying us.

The Quarries continues to be a runaway success. It's a small dedicated team running, maintaining and developing our campsite and instructing the activities but they could use your help.

Last October saw one of the most successful Gang Shows in recent years, the infectious enthusiasm of the cast singing and dancing more than make up for the time commitments of the production crew and the cast rehearsals. I have seen some of the rehearsals for this year's show. It's going to be a corker.

I feel privileged to be the District Commissioner for Milton Keynes Scouts and look forward to the adventures the next 12 months will bring.

The Scouts and Explorers were scored on their input and selection was undertaken by the planning team minus the DESC. Those selected were thrilled – the hard part was those that were not selected. Subsequently to this Sam Bradford has arranged a trip to Harleem Jamborette in The Netherlands and all who did not get selected were invited giving all an international opportunity.

The Jamboree and Kandersteg team have worked together as participants and families to fundraise. Building friendships and helping each other. Fundraising at the Community Car raffle, Fetes, litter picking and Bunning sausage sizzle to name but a few things. The Young people meet up at camps and get to know the Units they are going with. Unit 50 – 50 Bucks for WSJ and the unit going to Kandersteg. Both 36 young people and 4 leaders. NETWORK REPORT



SPECIAL PROJECTS



The Special Projects department has been heavily involved in the launch of the website from early 2017, and evolving it to meet the

needs of the District and its members. We've invested in capabilities within the website to accept online payments for events, with District Explorers using it for many of their planned camps and events.

We also embarked on a consolidation activity to bring The Quarries and Gang Show into the same platform, to create a single shared platform. This reduces effort to secure and maintain the websites. This shared platform, or network, has a number of key opportunities:

- 1. Update Once, Update All.
- 2. Offer Group websites on the platform, as a managed service. All groups have to do is supply their content.
- 3. Single user login across the network of websites.

We have also since May 2017 integrated the waiting list registration process using the website, directly into Online Scout Manager.

Our plans from April 2018 are to evolve the ecommerce side of the website/s to devolve management of the websites to the Explorers, Gang Show and The Quarries, as the teams supporting those get support from the Tech Team in doing so. We'll also review the capabilities on a regular basis to ensure they are evolving to meet the needs of the District.

We are also moving the website platform in November 2018 to Azure, the Microsoft Cloud platform, which will utilise the donation by Microsoft for our website platform.

The Office365 adoption continues slowly, as expected, with District and pockets of groups using the free offering from Microsoft, it is expected that this will continue slowly as leaders are encouraged to use their MKScouts email addresses for communications.

Milton Keynes is at the forefront of digital technologies in scouting, with a small number of districts now following our examples of Office365, Waiting List, Azure, OSM adoption, online forms, and online services supporting the groups within the District.

Special Projects has a broad portfolio, from IT to Growth and Development, the data from the District Dashboard that came as a result of the widespread adoption of the district OSM discount code will be used to develop the District growth strategy, and structure

The Waiting List stands at about 900 (April 2018) about a year after it was reset, and the list continues to grow apace, with a colony equivalency being added a week. We'll be engaging with Regional Development Services and Bucks County to formulate a plan to support the growth of Groups who wish to grow.

The District is a trust established under its rules which are common to all Districts. The governing documents are those of The Scout Association. They consist of a Royal Charter, which in turn gives authority to the bye laws of the Association and the policy, organisation and rules of The Scout Association.

Trustees are appointed in accordance with the policy, organisation and rules of The Scout Association.

The Milton Keynes District Scout Council includes the following groups:

- 1. Milton Keynes District Explorer Scouts
- 2. Milton Keynes Scout Resource Centre
- 3. The Quarries Scout Camp Site
- 4. Milton Keynes Gang Show
- 5. Milton Keynes District Active Support
- 6. Milton Keynes Scout Network

The trustees have identified the major risks to which they believe the charity is exposed. They have established systems to mitigate these, hold regular liaison meetings and are continually monitoring the individual finances of each group.

Objectives and Activities

To promote and support successful scouting throughout the Milton Keynes District. In planning activities for the year, the trustees have regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission with regard to public benefit. There are five different groups covering ages 6 to 25 and all young people are welcome to join regardless of personal background, faith or personal circumstances. Members benefit greatly in developing their self-confidence and social skills as well as learning new practical and life skills.

Achievements and performance

The charity continues to collect and administer subscriptions from the Scout Groups within its District. There have been a number of successful events, camps and activities throughout the year. Support has been provided to both the uniformed and executive teams within the Scout Groups. The District website and webstore have been updated and uprated to provide better communication both within and outside MK Scouts.

Financial review

At the end of the year total funds amounted to £116,264

Reserves policy

The District's policy on reserves is to hold sufficient resources to continue the charitable activities of the District should income fall short.

The District Executive Committee considers that the District should hold a sum equivalent to 10 months running costs, circa £80,000.

Investment policy

The District has adopted a low risk strategy to the investment of its funds. All funds are held in cash using only mainstream banks or building societies or The Scout Association's Short Term Investment Service.

Public benefit

The District meets the Charity Commission's public benefit criteria under both the advancement of education and the advancement of citizenship or community development headings.

Plans for future periods

Milton Keynes Scout District intends to continue developing opportunities for young people to experience Scouting. It also intends, by adopting the Scout Association's 'Vision Towards 2018', to promote the participation of young people in decision-making at all levels. It is intended that there will be additional support for Trustees of Scout Groups. The buildings at The Quarries Scout Campsite will be refurbished / replaced as necessary.
